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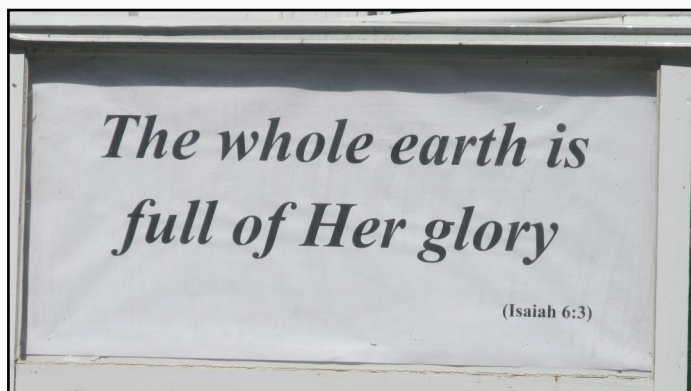
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News from the Church Council

Greetings from the Church Council. We have a number of maintenance issues that need to be addressed: patching up the chimney, removal of the dead tree in front of the church, maintaining the Emerson Garden, and hydroraking of aquatic plants at our lakeside lot as part of a pondwide initiative that includes removal of “nuisant” plants along the shoreline and continuing efforts to manage invasive species like Eurasian milfoil in Leverett Pond. We’ll have to get the chimney done by winter – Charlie Paulin has a potential source for the use of a lift to access points that can’t be reached by ladder. I’ll contact the town tree warden about removing the tree, while John Kealy and Tracey Field are in contact with GrassRoots about garden maintenance. Hydroraking was completed at the end of June. We paid for an hour’s worth of time for opening up our pond shore. A large pile of dead aquatic plants now lies on a tarp on the property. We’ll have to get rid of that before we hold our lakeside service at the end of July.

This year we reached out to young people in our congregation to let them know we have funds available to provide partial support for attending a Christian summer camp. Although we had no takers for that type of camp, we did support Lale, who wanted to attend a camp to be certified as a medical clown so she can entertain hospitalized

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Letter from Lee

Dear LCC Community,

As so many of us are, I am increasingly concerned about the state of our society... about the pain being inflicted, the disregard for human need, and the lack of respect for what's sacred, which is to say *all* that sustains life.

I look to my imagination and others' writings for ideas about how I can possibly help, and how we as a congregation might help even more than the great good we already do through our Missions effort. I have heard from others the same yearning for more direction.

Following are two offerings from friends of mine which I hope can help. First, an excerpt from a blog post by Eve Marko in which she tells about her horror over the plight of Gazans in their suffering, and the shame that appeared, for the actions of the leader of Israel, where she was born, in league with the president of the U.S., where she has lived nearly all her life.

"I don't need shame," she writes, "I need imagination to envisage peace, which for many people can only be found in fantasy land: *It can't happen, human beings are human beings, conditioned to fight, struggle, kill*, blah blah. Yes, there's that conditioning, and there's the conditioning to take care of each other, to stop at turtle crossings, to wave at passengers in passing trains, to help a stranger stuck in a closing subway car, even, as some have done, to jump down to the tracks to save someone from the path of an oncoming train.

"I need imagination to see, re-see, and explore that vision over and over, especially in the face of social media indignation and the panic spread by newspaper headlines. Especially in the face of cynicism, pessimism, and misanthropy."

And here is a story sent to me by a friend who is a teacher of the art of compassion.

"I have a friend in his early 20's who would absolutely be described as marginalized. He's a big goofy goof. He takes showers when he feels like it as opposed to when the rest of us think he should. He eats only enough to keep from passing out and his frame reflects that. He is in dire need of some personal grooming. His keen intellect puts him in an orbit far from most of ours. He's also an honest to goodness Christian. Which is why he often goes on mission trips to places that some

of us might call "God forsaken" except that he, more than most of us, knows they're perhaps the exact opposite.

"So maybe last month or earlier this month he finds himself in Ecuador. He finds himself sitting on the steps of a market talking to his group's tour guide when an obviously struggling gentlemen comes up. The man is toothless, tattered, likely mentally ill, and speaking barely intelligible Spanish (my friend speaks virtually no Spanish). The man is holding his hand out for some change, and my friend decides to give him \$20 while at the same time giving the man a gentle hand on the arm gesture. My friend's social anxiety is such that making physical contact with others is quite difficult. So this gesture is not the easiest for him to make. The man receiving my friend's gifts is clearly undone. He can't quite fathom what is going on so he simply sits down next to my friend. And they begin to interact as best they can given the various constraints they both face in this regard....

"Soon my friend has to leave with the group but he leaves with this very simple takeaway. The takeaway was the way that he introduced this story to me the other day: "I gave Jesus \$20 in Ecuador."

May we turn to our imaginations and open our hearts to the still small voice of our souls, giving us possibilities for how we can give to our brothers and sisters who need us.

“Yes, I heard my people singing! – in the glow of parlor coal-stove and on summer porches sweet with lilac air, from choir loft and Sunday morning pews and my soul was filled their harmonies.” Paul Robeson

Sunday, July 27 – Rain or Shine

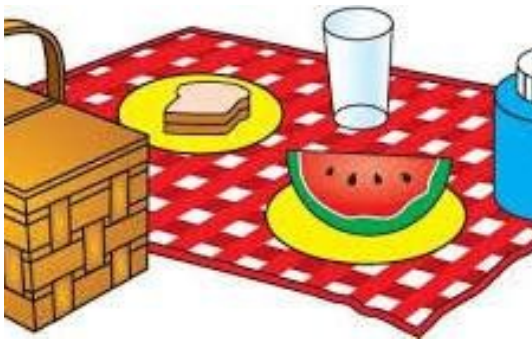
Lakeside service -- 11 a.m.

As to milfoil (see also Ralph Tiner's report on page 1) —

This past Monday the shoreline near the church dock was hydroraked and the weed pile was deposited just to the south (left) of the 'pondering log'. Note: the piles are BIG this year but I believe less pond floor sediment was removed. That should make for easier lifting and moving once the pile has dried out later this summer.

For some reason the area near the church dock was highly infested with milfoil this year. Removing it, as was done last Monday, is of considerable benefit to pond ecology.
