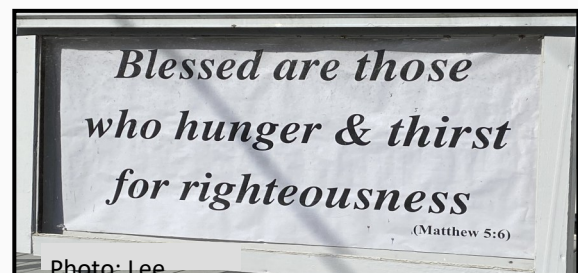

Hike for Hunger – Support “Team Mountain Goats”

There are some statistics where you don't want to lead the pack. Food insecurity is one of them. And yet we in Franklin and Hampshire counties do lead. Food insecurity varies greatly across Massachusetts. However, Western Massachusetts demonstrates the highest rates of food insecurity in the state. In 2023, 41% of all households in Western Massachusetts experienced food insecurity. And 43% of all households with children, experience child-level food insecurity. **Say that number out loud - 43%!**



In almost every second household with children, the children might be hungry, or have no access to nutritious and healthy food, or might not know when they will get their next meal. What does it mean to grow up not knowing when you can have your next meal? I hope that you know what's for dinner tonight. I hope that you can choose what you will eat today, tomorrow, and the day after. Spread this opportunity to others, make it a given for children to know that there will be another meal and another and another.

How can you help? October is hunger awareness month. As we did last year, our family, Lale, Ninette, and Brett, will participate in *Hike for Hunger*, a month-long event organized by the Amherst Survival Center. During this month, we will hike, and with you supporting our hiking team, we hope to raise funds that make a difference. This year, we are calling our team 'Mountain Goats', trusting that this name will help us hike gracefully and energetically throughout the month of October. Why are we hiking and what does your support mean?

The Amherst Survival Center is struggling to keep its shelves stocked. Their food pantry is now serving 61% more people than during the highest peaks of the pandemic, and more than double the number of people they served in 2019.
