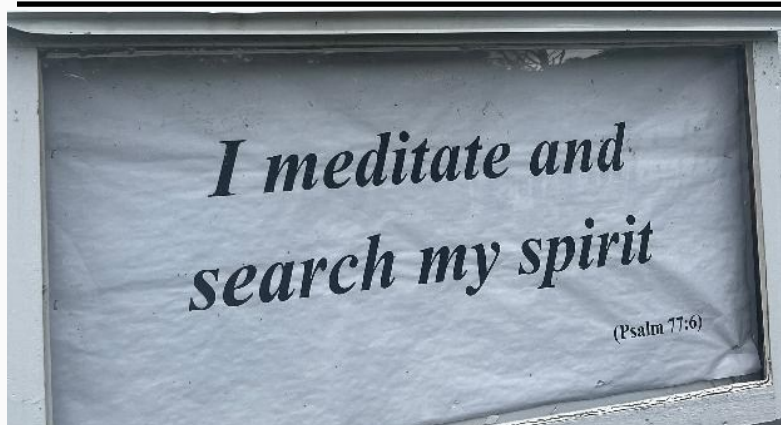

It's time for the choir to break for summer after its hard work all year.

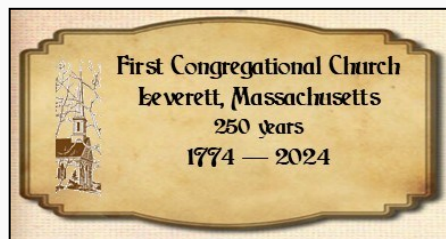

Letter from Lee

Pastor

Dear LCC Community,

As we leave our season of Easter in preparation for Pentecost Sunday on June 8, I found two bible stories that I believe express an important meaning of resurrection.

In the first story, from Kings 17:17-24, the prophet Elijah invokes the power of God to restore a widow's son to life. In the second story, from Luke 7:11-17, Jesus resurrects the only son of a widow.

After the epic and heroic story of Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection, the widows' stories move us one notch closer to home and can help us in our own struggles because they touch our own experience of desolation. We need only see these stories as a metaphor for "leaning in to the sharp points," as Pema Chodron puts it.

We know the experience of desolation throughout our lives, in large ways—loss of a loved one... loss of a livelihood... loss of health—and in small ways—paralysis in the face of a hard decision... avoidance of revealing a difficult but needed truth... the need to make amends after an argument with a loved one.

The key to the message of these stories to me is in that word "desolation," which is a synonym for "emptiness." For it is when we let go *into* our desolation... when we let go of vain attempts to avoid or resist or fix the pain of our situation... when we allow ourselves to be *emptied* of self with a small "s,"...that is when we make room for something else to enter... something higher and deeper we call by so many names, including the grace of God... Self with a capital "S."

Every time we allow ourselves to travel through this cycle, it is a resurrection story, teaching us to *trust* reality instead of resisting it, even in our pain. It is *our* resurrection story, over and over. Living our story

fully *makes way* for the good news. Whether we face desolation in a small situation or one as large as a widow losing her only son, it is in letting go into our emptiness that we find new life.

Missions Report for June

One Great Hour of Sharing

Our congregation raised \$385 for OGHS, which then becomes a mighty resource throughout the world. Where there is great need, our contributions join with so many others to help in ways we cannot imagine, for example:

- Our gifts support the Council of Churches in Sierra Leone (one of the poorest countries in the world) serving approximately one million church members and nearly three million beneficiaries annually. They establish educational programs that equip women with the essential skills needed to take leadership roles in society. Microlending empowers women to establish small businesses, provides finance education, improves access to clean water, and promotes community development. The microcredit program has enhanced women's leadership, business skills, and literacy.
- In Kamara Town, women worked together to build a church and a school, which were previously unavailable in the community. Because of the lack of educational infrastructure, children had to travel long distances to attend school and often started school later than usual. With a school now in their community, children can begin their education at the appropriate age, and parents find peace knowing their children are safe and learning close to home. And so much more....

The King Lot, a story

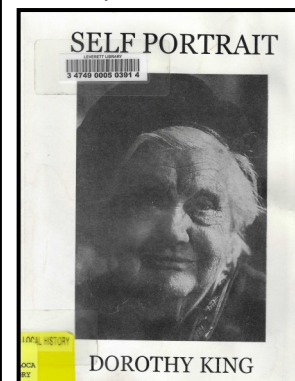
The church owns five pieces of property, though not the land the church sits on ... that belongs to the Town of Leverett. Beyond the church is the expansive King Lot on an acre of land given to the church in 1974 by Dorothy King. Sometimes the King Lot is mistaken as a town common. (Actual town common land includes a small triangle of land just downhill from the church, as well as Montague Road frontage across from the town hall and post office.)

Dorothy King was born in 1890 in New York and came to Leverett early in the 1920s, though she had visited earlier. She set about buying, rehabbing and selling houses, and acquiring land, mostly in East Leverett. “I also paint portraits and landscapes, write in this diary, play contract bridge, attend a auctions, take care of a large garden and have lots of fun.” Auctioneers knew her well and knew her eye for rocking chairs.

To say she was eccentric is an understatement. Many Leverett folks worked for her, and one diversion now is trying to figure out those whom she mentions in her book, and there are many. “My boys” were among her favorites, lugging bricks from a cellar for use elsewhere was one chore. (*Fact: Your editor once scraped shutters in her employ, probably lured by her friend Lois Woodard.*) Leverett’s attractions included “this beautiful church with its poetic spire.” (The Emerson Garden on the knoll is different story in itself.) We thank you, Dorothy King.
